Neither said that they were ready to withdraw from the trade agreements. Senator Clinton said she would make sure that there would be core labor safety and environmental standards in the agreement and it would be enforceable. Senator Clinton pointed out that the Cleveland Plain Dealer examined Senator Obama's attacks on her regarding NAFTA and found they were erro-
