## U.S. calls Cincinnati Ballet dancer's visa into question



Cincinnati Ballet is in the middle of a back-stage drama

Company member Liang Fu, a citizen of the People's Republic of China and a rising star in the company, is waiting to have his work visa renewed by the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Service.

The ballet first received word of issues with a renewal of Fu's work visa in April, and as of now, it cannot be sure he'll be able to dance in the 2010-11 season, which starts at the end of September.

According to Ballet spokesperson Missie Santomo, the Immigration Service is delaying visa renewal and has asked for specific evidence that Fu has achieved "distinction" through a high level of achievement in his field, substantially above that ordinarily encountered, and an explanation of why an American dancer could not bring the same ability to the stage as Fu.

Fu, 26, a graduate of the Beijing Dance Academy, has signed on for a third year with Cincinnati Ballet in 2010-11, and he's scheduled to participate in the Jackson International Ballet Competition this summer. He joined Cincinnati Ballet in 2008

Ballet artistic director and CEO Victoria Morgan says, "It's been amazing to have (Fu) with us. He's so smart. Choreographers love working with him."

Because the company is currently reduced to 23 dancers "all the dancers are essential; they all impact the quality and artistic integrity of the com-

pany.'

Because dancer contracts for 2010-11 were finalized in February and March, "at this late date, it would be literally impossible to replace Fu, and therefore the artistic caliber of our company would be gravely impacted if we could not secure

his visa," Morgan said.

Cincinnati Ballet has until May 27 to make its case with the Immigration Service.

Fu says he has "no idea, no clue," why the difficulty with his visa this year. He said here were issues with his first work visa two years ago, but this pressure is greater.

"It's frustrating that we're still having the same problem," he said.

Fu hopes to make his dancing career at Cincinnati Ballet, moving up to soloist and principal dancer and enjoying "the variety of the repertoire and the environment."

Diversity, says Santomo, is another argument the ballet is making as it collects support letters.

"One of the greatest strengths of Cincinnati Ballet is its wealth of diversity, which includes international dancers who come from different backgrounds and methods of ballet training," Santomo said.

"Fu has met and spent much time with our wonderful and large Chinese community," Morgan added. "He is involved with them in teaching dance, galas, working with the Chinese Chamber and generally being a special part of that community. They rally to his performances and cheer him on.

"The Chinese community has also been generous in their financial support of Cincinnati Ballet in large part because of Fu."
