Ohio Governor Mike DeWine Week in Review

A recently released report from the Wildlife Management Institute, Responsive Management, and Southwick Associates showed that wildlife-based recreation contributed nearly \$12.5 billion to Ohio's economy in 2022, according to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) Division of Wildlife.

"Ohio has rolling hills for hunting, vast waterways for fishing, and thriving habitats for birding," Ohio Gov. Mike DeWine said. "The di-

verse natural wonders of Ohio prove once again the state really is 'The Heart of it All.

Governor DeWine and Lt. Governor Jon Husted announced that the state is partnering with Intel, JobsOhio, and the Ohio Grants Alliance to formalize a semiconductor supply chain consortium in Ohio's Silicon Heartland.

The creation of the Silicon Heartland Supplier Consortium will better position Ohio to:

* Become one of two new semiconductor clusters in the Unit-

* Help current and prospective Ohio suppliers compete for new federal grant funding for semiconductor materials and manufacturing equipment.

"Ohio is committed to ensuring the success of the Silicon Heartland," said Governor DeWine. "Bringing together industry partners to onshore this critical industry is key to strengthening our national security, spurring future innovation, and making our econo-

"When we were working to attract Intel to establish its semi-

conductor fab facility in Ohio, we knew that most of the jobs would be created from the supply chain that followed," said Lt. Governor Husted. "The establishment of this semiconductor consortium can play an important role in establishing Ohio as the Silicon Heartland.



Lt. Governor Husted joined Chair of the Greater Cleveland Partnership's Board of Directors Paul Dolan for a fireside chat focused on economic development at the organization's annual Leadership Forum.

Governor DeWine announced that applications are now being accepted for a fourth round of child care stabilization grants and that steps are being taken to increase the base rates for publicly funded child care beginning Feb. 4, 2024.

"We have been focused on increasing the safe, stable, quality child care programs to ensure Ohio's youngest students have the best possible foundation for their future learning," said Governor DeWine. "We are now focusing on supporting early childhood professionals in order to increase the availability of child care spaces for working parents and caregivers."

"During these programs, teachers are immersed in the local business community, gaining insights into various careers and understanding the essential skills students require for success. Armed with this knowledge, educators return to their schools better equipped to provide students with the necessary tools and guidance for a prosperous career path.'

Institutions of higher education can apply today to administer bootcamps. Once awarded, they can enroll teachers into their bootcamp, and when the teachers complete the courses, the institution

will be reimbursed for tuition costs. Qualifying coursework is to be delivered in bootcamp format and may include Continuing Education Units (CEUs) or graduate credit coursework.

The goal of the program is to incentivize teacher professional development and expose teachers to the career opportunities for their students in critical sectors like Advanced Manufacturing, Broadband & 5G, Cybersecurity, Health-

care, Transportation, or other trades. A total of \$500,000 is available through this pro-

Governor DeWine Announces Funding Support for Village of East Palestine

(EAST PALESTINE, Ohio)—November 17, 2023 Ohio Governor Mike DeWine and Ohio Department of Development Director Lydia Mihalik announced that the state will award the village of East Palestine \$150,000 to help support the purchase of new emergency response equipment.

East Palestine, which was the site of February's Norfolk Southern train derailment. previously secured grant funding from the federal government to partially cover the cost of two eight-ton dump trucks, a one-ton utility bed truck, and a drone. To reduce the amount of local funding necessary to cover the difference, the Governor's Office of Ap-



palachia is contributing \$150,000, representing more than 65 percent of the reguired local match.

"This funding is another example of our administration's continued commitment to the East Palestine community," said Governor DeWine. "This investment will significantly reduce East Palestine's share of expenses associated with this new equipment."

The existing village trucks are more than 20 years old and have been used to haul materials and supplies to and from the derailment site. The East Palestine Fire Department, which was forced to borrow equipment for overhead views of the derailment, will receive the drone.

The tragedy of last February's derailment highlighted the urgent need for enhanced preparedness measures," said Lydia Mihalik, director of the Ohio Department of Development. "While we hope that nothing like this ever happens in any of our communities again, the residents of East Palestine can have some peace of mind knowing the village is better equipped to assess and respond in emergency situations.'

Governor DeWine also announced today that the first round of 0% interest, forgivable loans to be awarded as part of the East Palestine Emergency Support Program will be announced as early as next week. The loans will be awarded to businesses to assist with ongoing expenses and recovery efforts associated with the train derailment.
